

CONSERVATION: A NEW DOMINANT LAND IN SUTTON JUNCTION

Eastman, May 15, 2015 – Appalachian Corridor and Mount Echo Conservation Association (MECA) are pleased to announce the protection of 12.9 ha in the Town of Sutton, thanks to a generous donation made by Mr. Arthur Faucher. Mr. Faucher's ecogift adds to the 12 000 ha of private lands already under conservation within Appalachian Corridor's territory of action. When asked about what led him to donate his property, Mr. Faucher explained: "Many people in my area started making ecological gifts, so I decided to join them. I do this for future generations."

As a first dominant land in Sutton Junction, this property opens the door for a new conservation area. "Fresh water and Wood Turtles. Cedars, Hemlocks, Yellow Birch, Black Cherry, Spruce and Balsam Fir. A winter yard for white-tailed deers. Our first dominant land in Sutton Junction. This is a good start. Thank you Arthur Faucher" said M. Brian Herman, President of MECA.

An abundance of wildlife and species at risk

Mr. Faucher's property has undeniable ecological value and features two species vulnerable to harvesting in Quebec: the Two-leaved Toothwort and Ostrich Fern. However, its main ecological interest lies in its streams and wetlands, populated by the Wood Turtle, a species listed as threatened in Canada and vulnerable in Quebec. Mr. Faucher made several interesting wildlife sightings of his own through the years. "Many wild animals use this land: the white-tailed deer, moose, foxes, hares..." The land also boasts a spring Mr. Faucher is especially proud of: "I used to go there often as a kid. I have many fond memories of being there."
